LAUNCH OF THE QUÉBEC DANSE EVENT IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF LOUISE LECAVALIER

Montreal, April 22, 2014 – Today at 12:30 p.m., the Regroupement québécois de la danse (RQD) launched the 3rd edition of Québec Danse with the unveiling of the 2014 Choreographic Trace. Created by Louise Lecavalier, an iconic figure in contemporary dance, the footprints in front of the Salle Wilfrid-Pelletier mark the 50th anniversary of Place des Arts.

This year's Choreographic Trace is impressive: over 100 footprints, in seven highly graphic diagonals over a 30-foot radius. Conceived as an installation based on a sequence from *So Blue*, a work by Louise Lecavalier set to the visceral music of Turkish composer Mercan Dede, the trajectory is aptly entitled *DNA Traces*. Louise Lecavalier, after all, personifies the very DNA of dance, in all its power, complexity and infinite variations.

"One can imagine this as the dance of two 'cosmi-comic' serpents in running shoes, imitating the double helix structure of a single DNA molecule—two complementary versions, wound onto themselves, of the same information," explains Louise Lecavalier. "The serpents can disentwine, and thus make copies of themselves, twins. From one generation to the next, the DNA information can change, which allows both constancy and transformation. I like constancy, I like transformation, and I like the notion of the double. The DNA asserts itself. So make your dance a twin—similar and different!"

The event's spokespersons, Marc Boivin and Anne Plamondon, hosted the unveiling of the Choreographic Trace. In attendance were some one hundred artists, as well as Marc Blondeau, President and CEO of Place des Arts, and Karine Boivin Roy, councillor for Ville-Marie and the official representative of the Mayor of Montreal.

At the invitation of the RQD, some **ten performers** interpreted the Trace with their own brand of dance, *similar and different*, for Louise Lecavalier. The choreographer and dancer **Lucie Grégoire**; young contemporary dancer **Kim Henry**; dancers **Simon Ampleman**, **Joe Danny Aurélien**, **Geneviève Gagné** and **Geneviève Boulet** in a formula Bouge Anyway; Zab Maboungou/Compagnie Danse Nyata Nyata dancers **Mithra Rabel**, **Rhodnie Désir** and **Karla Etienne**; and finally **Philippe Meunier**, contemporary jig choreographer and dancer. Sublime!

The guests were then treated to a <u>video</u> in which Louise Lecavalier performs the sequence of steps comprising her *DNA Traces*. A series of small cross-steps, movements which the choreographer says are easy to imitate—or diverge from as you please, according to your own rhythm, at full speed or in slow motion.

Participants also had the chance to experience one of the new aspects of the 2014 Choreographic Trace: **augmented reality**, which will allow passers-by to see Louise Lecavalier perform the steps in real time. A stroke of techno magic!

The spokespersons also launched the **#MaTrace** contest, inviting those present to join in the dance, and to have their photos or videos posted on their Facebook or Twitter accounts with the hashtag #MaTrace. Pure pleasure!

Starting today, and until June 7, the public will have free access to the installation. They will be able to walk on the Trace, dance on it, recreate it or freely transform it. Those with smart phones will also be able to view the video by scanning the QR Code, and of course experience it in augmented reality by downloading the Aurasma app and following the directions shown at the starting point.

We encourage as many people as possible to enter the #MaTrace contest, which ends on April 29! Two lucky entrants will win a pair of tickets offered by Danse Danse and the Festival TransAmériques.
