APRIL 29, 2015 QUEBEC MESSAGE ON INTERNATIONAL DANCE DAY BY HAROLD RHÉAUME

At my house, we didn't dance. It wasn't part of our lifestyle. My first images of dance came from musicals that I watched on TV as a child, after coming home from school. The first two men I ever saw dance were Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly. I remember the impact it had on me. I couldn't believe that so much emotion could be expressed by simply dancing. To be powerful, agile, funny, smooth, rhythmical, sensual, athletic, touching, exciting: all that by simply moving one's body! It's absolutely crazy, when you think about it. But that's what dance is all about. Crazy, inexplicable and accessible to all.

When I began to dance professionally, it was to express things I couldn't say in any other way. No words could convey what I felt as much as movement.

"Everything that is in motion must be moved by something," said Aristotle.

Everyone of us, to varying degrees, alone or in a group, has this deep desire to move, to advance. And "to move" makes me think of "to be moved." We are often moved when seeing a child or elderly person dance, in the simplest way. Dance, in its most basic form, is accessible to all.

Many things unite the human race. And I think that dance is one of them. All of the earth's peoples, all of its tribes and societies have incorporated dance in their traditions and cultures. However personal, ritualistic, sacred or joyous it may be. To celebrate life, death, birth, the solstice, or simply an emotion that can find no other outlet than through the body.

Let's put aside our differences, our opposing views, our taboos and judgements. Let's forget our embarrassment or unease.

Let dance move us, in both senses of the word.

Together, let's dance.
